SECTION A · Short, 1 to 2 marks

- A1** State what an enzyme does to the activation energy of a reaction, and state one quantity that an enzyme does not change. [2]

SECTION B · Standard, 3 to 5 marks

- B1** Explain why a given enzyme catalyses only one reaction, using the terms active site, complementary and enzyme-substrate complex in your answer. [4]

- B2** Compare the lock-and-key model of enzyme action with the induced fit model. [4]

- B3** Explain why every enzyme is a globular protein, and why a fibrous protein such as collagen cannot be one. [3]

- B4** A molecule built to resemble the strained, half-reacted form of a substrate binds to its enzyme far more tightly than the substrate itself does. Suggest what this tells us about the shape of the active site, and suggest why such a molecule would slow the enzyme down. [3]
