SECTION A · Warm-up

- A1** Find the area of the region bounded by the curve $y = 4 - x^2$, the x-axis and the y-axis, in the first quadrant. [3]

- A2** Find the area enclosed between the line $y = x$ and the curve $y = x^2$. [4]

SECTION B · Standard

- B1** Find the area enclosed between the curves $y = 9 - x^2$ and $y = x^2 + 1$. [5]

- B2** The curve C has parametric equations $x = t^3$, $y = 3t^2$, $t \geq 0$. Find the exact area of the region bounded by C , the x -axis and the line $x = 8$, and verify your answer by first converting C to Cartesian form. [6]

- B3** Write the limit, as $\delta x \rightarrow 0$, of the sum $\sum x^2 \delta x$ taken over strips from $x = 1$ to $x = 3$ as an integral, and evaluate it. [3]

SECTION C · Stretch

- C1** The curve C has parametric equations $x = 3 \cos t$, $y = \sin t$, $0 \leq t \leq \pi/2$. Show that the area of the region bounded by C and the coordinate axes is $3\pi/4$. [5]

- C2** The curve C has parametric equations $x = 2 \sin t$, $y = 3 \sin 2t$, $0 \leq t \leq \pi/2$. Show that the area of the region between C and the x -axis is exactly 4. [6]
